





UNIQUE OR NOTABLE ITEMS:

Adelaide, Australia: 'Snout' housing:

Urban renewal housing with little/no front yards and large garages. Common in higher density areas.





Adelaide, Australia: Cul de sac connecting pathways:

Reasonably common in outer suburban residential areas with lots of cul de sacs.





Adelaide, Australia: Tree lined avenues/central squares:

Many squares surrounding central city area of Adelaide with frequent tree lined streets on main throughfares. More frequent in higher income areas and city fringes.



Adelaide, Australia: Hilly areas:

Suburban residential areas located in hilly terrain with resulting curvy roads, lack of median strips and limited roadside parking.



Adelaide, Australia: Café precincts:

Outdoor café seating adjoining suburban residential areas, more prolific in higher income areas. Includes outdoor pub seating in many suburban and city hotels.







Adelaide, Australia: Beaches and reserves:

Suburban residential areas located in close proximity to beaches and beach side reserves. Extensive access available both north and south of city centre in high and in low income areas.
